

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

Four loose plates, 11 1/8 x 8 inches or the reverse; two are in color, two are b&w. Slight dust soiling and light creases; otherwise, very good. Contained in a moderately worn string-tied printed paper envelope from the Electro-Light Engraving Co., William Street, New York, addressed in ink "E. Bierstadt, 94 Reade St, City, C.P.Y."

Edward Bierstadt, 1824 - 1906, photographer and engraver, was born in Prussia and emigrated to Bedford, Massachusetts at an early age. Edward, and his younger brother, Albert, the noted landscape painter, opened a studio in New York, 1860, where he produced engravings of his brother's paintings, and photographed and published a large quantity of stereo images under the imprint Bierstadt Brothers.

These four plates are Artotypes, a process similar to the collotype. Of these, two plates of seashells are in full color; one is captioned in type "Chrome Artotype, E. Bierstadt, New York." The other plates are not captioned. "The foremost user was probably Edward Bierstadt, of New York, who used it primarily for illustrations of business catalogs, with orders that could sometimes run to 120,000 for a single job. 

Blanquart-Evrard was a prolific inventor of photographic process and notable publisher of outstanding photographic work. "In 1863, he published an important treatise, Intervention de l'art dans la photographie, in which he describes the negative as a raw material begging to be interpreted by the photographer, modulating shadows and highlights, in order to obtain a relavant and valid artwork. Such a conception predated the pictorialist aesthetic." Pierre-Lin Renié, Encyclopedia of Nineteenth-Century Photography, p. 168. First printed in Mémories de la Société Impériale des Sciences, de l'Agriculture et des Arts de Lille, 1863, this 1864 publication is the first separate edition. The photographic frontispiece was made by F. Pierson.

Of this first separate edition, OCLC locates only three copies: Deutsches Museum Munchen, Paris - CNAM, and Bibliotheque Nationale de France. Roosens and Salu No. 921; [other titles] 2105. 2129, 2958, 1602.



Of the ten copies located in OCLC, the National Gallery of Canada and the George Eastman House are the only North American holders. Not located by Roosens and Salu.








"The first International Congress of Photography was held in Paris in 1889, with the object of giving those interested in photography, whatever their nationality, the opportunity of meeting together to discuss questions of general importance. It was hoped that in some cases standards might be agreed upon, so that the confusing and often inconvenient variations that occur, for example, in nomenclature, in definitions, in the character of apparatus, sometimes even in the same country, but noticeable more especially in passing from one country to another, might at least be reduced." AMERICAN PHOTOGRAPHY, Vol. IV, January - December 1910, p. 226. Among the attendees are: Becquerel, Fizeau, Davanne, Marey, Londe, Vidal, Wada, Abney, Robinson, Ives, Alinari, et al. Among the plates are an early form of a zone or tonal scale, which could be removed for use in the studio. Held in conjunction with the Exposition Universelle de 1889.

The prior owner, Léon Ernest Gaumont was a French inventor, engineer, and industrialist who was a pioneer of the motion picture industry.



Over the years, I have examined and sold at least seven copies of this manual in the first and second editions - the only ones to contain original ferrotypes. In every instance, the ferrotype was inserted under a printed window overmat, and affixed directly to the front and/or rear board of the binding (the first edition contains two ferrotypes, the second edition only one.) This copy, although in a later binding, has printed yellow boards in the front and rear, to which the ferrotype is mounted on the reverse






with a printed window overmat. The boards are on original tabs, and the front wrapper also serves as the title page (although there is evidence that a leaf is lacking where the title page would normally be.) I have never before encountered this variant, nor have I seen mention of it in all the years I have been cataloguing and selling photographic manuals. It may be assumed that this was a sample binding that was ultimately rejected as too delicate for distribution. Regretfully, this copy is lacking the second original ferrotype, which might not have been included in this sample binding.

A complete manual with formulary for making direct positives on enameled iron with collodion, similar to the ambrotype. The first book to contain original images on a base material other than paper. Every copy contains unique ferrotype portraits.

[237] of 1872 issue; the main text, which in 1872 ended on p. 219, is extended with further anecdotes of tintype studios, replacing the New York times' account of the funeral of Samuel F.B. Thomas Sutton was born on 22 September 1819 in London. After studying at Caius College, Cambridge, he and his family moved to the island of Jersey. In the early 1850s, he made a number of calotype views of Rome, aided by lessons obtained from Frederic Flacheron. Wanting to print his negatives from Rome, he became interested in the industrial, developing-out printing process of Louis-Desire Blanquart-Evrard. This led him to devise a developing-out process of his own, the details of which he published in 1855. In 1855-1857,


Sutton and Blanquart-Evrard founded an industrial titled photographic printing facility at Jersey. During this time they also started a journal, Photographic Notes, which Sutton continued to edit until 1867. A prolific writer, Sutton wrote a number of technical manuals, contributed articles to different photographic journals, and compiled a photographic dictionary. He also was interested in optics, designing a triplet lens and a wide-angle duplet lens filled with water. He died on 19 March 1875 in Pwllheli, North Wales. John Towler,1811 - 1889, was born in Yorkshire, England and educated as a nonresident student at St. John's in Cambridge; he migrated to the United States in 1850, where he taught at Lima Seminary before his appointment in 1852 at Hobart College as a professor of modern languages, mathematics, anatomy, pharmacy, chemistry, civil engineering and medical




jurisprudence. In 1855, he was awarded a M.D. from Geneva Medical College and served as its dean until 1872.





"Dr. H. W. Vogel discovered in 1873 that dyes added to photographic materials extended their sensitivity to colours other than blue. In 1882 commercial dry plates were produced, and these isochromatic, or

orthochromatic, plates soon came into general use. Because they were much more sensitive to blue than green, they were normally exposed through a yellow filter to balance up the exposure. In 1884 Dr. Vogel discovered a method of sensitising plates to orange as well as green light." Coe, Brian, Color Photography: The First Hundred Years, 1840 - 1940, p. 34. These discoveries were fundamental for correct color photography and three-color photography. "Vogel's invention of color sensitizers. 

Charles Waldack wrote the following in his introduction to this second edition "... a work on photography is out of date when it is a year old, and this consideration has induced us to write an entirely new work, instead of publishing a third edition of A TREATISE OF PHOTOGRAPHY ON COLLODION... 1857 (the first manual on the melainotype or, tintype)." This is a comprehensive manual and formulary on all aspects of

the collodion process, both negative and positive (ambrotypes, melainotypes, etc); additionally, it discusses making enlargements, stereoscopic pictures, the calotype process, etc., and concludes with an encyclopedia section on chemicals. The first edition with this title was also published in 1860 and is a bit more common than the second edition, which has been "carefully revised and corrected; slight alterations have been made in some formulas..."


